Introduction and Highlights

Over 16,000 Served During 2020-2021 Fiscal Year

ApprenticeshipNC served 16,894 participants in fiscal year 2020-2021 and registered 109 new programs across 10 industry sectors as of June 30, 2021. Youth Apprenticeship saw the most growth, with an increase from 5,461 youth served in previous FY 2020 to 5,679 youth served in FY 2021.

Economic Development Welcomes New VP


About This Report

The data in this report reflects the number of participants served during the fiscal year. The term "active" refers to the number of apprentices, both youth and adult, that are participating in training. This also includes individuals enrolled in pre-apprenticeship, on-the-job learning or master craftsworker programs. Number served includes those that participated in training and either completed or canceled during the fiscal year.


Apprentices Served During Each Fiscal Year


Youth Apprentices Served During Each Fiscal Year (Began as a HS Student)


ApprenticeshipNC connected with 421 new businesses covering every industry from healthcare to energy. A full 25% of these new contacts are in discussions to develop an apprenticeship program, with an additional 25% moving to design and register their new apprenticeship.



vitalink helped ApprenticeshipNC expand its footprint statewide by spreading the apprenticeship message and educating businesses. The increased engagement with employers led to 109 new programs registered during the past year, despite COVID-19 obstacles.



We are happy to announce that 150 occupations were added this past fiscal year with the biggest successes in manufacturing and construction, including several non-traditional insurance and healthcare apprenticeships programs.

Serving Our Armed Forces

U.S. Army's Fort Bragg base along with the Marine Corps Camp Lejeune and Air Station Cherry Point are among eight U.S. military bases hosting apprenticeship programs. Apprenticeship is honored to partner with these military bases to further develop apprenticeship programs in our state. An apprenticeship program was also developed with the state's National Guard for all units to earn credentials for time spent in training.


These programs create pathways into high-quality civilian careers for transitioning service members as well as

supporting their promotions with state and national credentials.

"Service members have a better opportunity to move into a civilian career at an equivalent or higher level having earned that certificate," said Eric Burgos, program director for the NC National Guard Employment Center. "I'll give you one example: we had an employee begin working for a trucking company. When he mentioned he had his journeyman's certificate, he immediately got an \$8+/hour raise."

By connecting businesses with the Community College System and local colleges, ApprenticeshipNC has created a robust and flexible solution for businesses to train new employees and upskill for new technologies.

The collaborative effort has generated consistent

growth since 2016. ApprenticeshipNC now has community colleges hosting 29 pre-apprenticeship programs and 18 apprenticeship programs, offering 138 occupations with 975 participants served.

Events

State Fair Apprentice Contests, Oct. 18-24, 2021



Due to COVID-19, the N.C. State Fair was cancelled in 2020. The State Fair will return in 2021, with the ApprenticeshipNC contests taking place Oct. 18-24. Competitions will focus on the following skilled trades: masonry, electrical, carpentry, HVAC and plumbing. ApprenticeshipNC will partner with SkillsUSA on two additional contests: cosmetology and a mobile robotics competition for middle and high school students.

National Apprenticeship Week, Nov. 8-14, 2020

Held annually, National Apprenticeship Week is an opportunity for institutions to showcase their support for Registered Apprenticeship. The focus of these events is to bring partners together, providing an opportunity for business leaders, career seekers, educational institutions, and other critical partners to share the benefits of registered apprenticeship. In North Carolina, nine Employers, five Consortia, and eight community colleges participated this past November.

Convenings, Jan. 2021-April 2021

ApprenticeshipNC hosted seven convenings throughout the state in the 2020-2021 fiscal year. The purpose of these convenings is to introduce registered apprenticeship to potential sponsors and to recruit individuals in underrepresented populations for registered apprenticeship opportunities.

ApprenticeshipNC Annual Conference, April 27-28, 2021

In April 2021, ApprenticeshipNC held its annual conference virtually through WebEx. The event averaged over 400 in attendance spanning two halfday sessions, with 698 total registrations. The conference hosted a variety of workshops with topics such as demystifying apprenticeship, sustaining the future workforce and veterans in Apprenticeship. Speakers included John Ladd of the USDOL, Peyton Holland, executive director of SkillsUSA, and Tariq Bokhari, the founder of Carolina Fintech Hub. Roger Collins, apprenticeship manager of Siemens Energy Inc., served as master of ceremonies.
